## February 20-President's Day

Presidents Day is on Monday, Feb. 20 this year. Presidents Day is celebrated on the third Monday of February every year.

The date of Presidents Day changes every year in part because of the Uniform Holiday Bill <u>signed in 1968</u> by President Lyndon B. Johnson. The Uniform Holiday Bill mandated that three holidays, including Presidents Day, occur on Mondays to prevent midweek shutdowns and add long weekends to the federal calendar.

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## February 23-Iwo Jima Flag Raising

Joe Rosenthal missed the moment when United States Marines first raised the American flag over Mount Suribachi during the Battle of Iwo Jima. The Associated Press photographer was still climbing up the mountain at the time.

But when Marines raised another flag, he was there to capture the image for the ages. And he would spend the rest of the war arguing over whether he'd staged the second raising.

Fighting on Iwo Jima lasted 36 days, but it took the Marines only five days to reach the top of the eightsquare-mile island's highest point, Mount Suribachi. Almost from the get-go, the fighting was brutal. Japan had a year to reinforce the island with tunnels carved into the mountainside, hidden artillery positions and a network of reinforced bunkers.

Allied bombing and naval barrages could do nothing to soften the island's defenses for the attacking Marines. When they landed, they were facing the full force of its Japanese defenders, who were willing to fight to the death for every inch of volcanic rock.

So when the Marines topped Suribachi and planted the first flag on Feb. 23, 1945, it was a huge boon to the Marines fighting below and the sailors offshore. The ships blew their horns when they saw the flag. Gunfire and cheers erupted from the sailors, Marines and Coast Guardsmen fighting below.

Gunfire also erupted from the Japanese soldiers, who saw the flag as just a new target atop the island's highest peak. After the flag was raised, a hail of bullets came in around the Marines on Mount Suribachi.

Marine Staff Sgt. Louis Lowery of Leatherneck Magazine was there to capture the first raising, but had to dive for cover when the enemy started shooting. His camera was broken in the fall, and he had to go back down the mountain to get new gear. On his way to the rear, he passed Rosenthal and his Graflex 4x5 camera. The AP representative was about to get something few war photographers ever did: a second chance at capturing the moment.

By the time Rosenthal reached the top, the first flag was still there. Like any good photographer, he waited around to see what came next. He didn't have to wait long.

After seeing how the American troops responded to the first flag being raised, <u>Marine Corps</u> Lt. Col. Chandler Johnson <u>ordered a new, larger flag</u> to be raised over the battlefield. This 96 x 56-inch flag would be one that could be seen across the island.

Rosenthal was present for this flag raising, but he almost missed the second moment, too.

Marine Sgt. William Genaust was filming the moment and asked Rosenthal whether he was in his way. The AP photographer turned to look at Genaust and realized the Marines were raising the flag.

He had to snap the now-iconic photo without looking into the viewfinder. His next shot was a group photo of 16 Marines and two <u>Navy</u> corpsmen around the raised flag.

"Out of the corner of my eye, I had seen the men start the flag up," he later <u>told Colliers Magazine</u>. "I swung my camera and shot the scene. That is how the picture was taken, and when you take a picture like that, you don't come away saying you got a great shot. You don't know."

Rosenthal sent the photo to be processed on Guam, where it was quickly sent out to The Associated Press in New York. Within 17 hours of the flag raising, the photo was on the newswires -- and on the desk of President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

It won a Pulitzer Prize for photography in 1945 and became a symbol of the enduring spirit of United States Marines.

In 1951, a former petty officer and sculptor named Felix de Weldon was commissioned to design a national memorial for the Marine Corps to be built in the Washington, D.C., area. He chose a sculpture of the image of the Marines on Mount Suribachi. It took three years to build the 78-foot-tall United States Marine Corps War Memorial, which was dedicated in 1954.



## Program Spotlight #1

#### Buddy Poppy/National Home Department Program Chairman: Leigh Ann Zigler

The "Buddy" Poppy and National Home program works together to support veterans and veteran families. As you will notice I have separated the report forms. I hope that it will be easier to report what you do.

As the VFW's official memorial flower, the Poppy represents the blood shed by American service members. It reiterates that we will not forget their sacrifices. The VFW conducted its first Poppy distribution before Memorial Day in 1922, becoming the first veterans organization to organize a nationwide distribution. The VFW "Buddy" Poppies are assembled by disabled, hospitalized, aging and needy American veterans who would be paid for their work. To order "Buddy" Poppies is done through the VFW National Headquarters. Order your Auxiliary some Poppies and plan to have a Poppy Drive. When having a Poppy Drive, anyone can help with this function. Ask a youth group to help your auxiliary out. There are so many ways to promote the "Buddy" Poppy at your post and Auxiliary functions, sporting events, and other community activities that your Auxiliary does. Promote the National Home help line at the same time. When your Auxiliary has a Poppy Drive, remind your volunteers they are NOT SELLING the Poppies, BUT DISTRIBUTING THEM FOR DONATIONS. Never refuse someone a Poppy because they are unable to donate money. Remember that we distribute "Buddy" Poppies to remind everyone of the sacrifices of our veterans. When you receive any monies from Poppies remember that it is to go into your relief fund. Your relief fund can be used to provide financial, social and emotional support to Veterans and their families and to support the VFW National Home for Children. Other ways to promote the "Buddy" Poppy and the National Home include:

- Social Media
- At Fundraising events
- Become or Buy a National Home Life Membership for someone.
- Collect donations for the VFW National Home for Children
- Purchase from Amazon National Home Wish List and don't forget to sign up for Amazon Smile to benefit the VFW National Home.
- Have a get together for a youth group and have them make a poppy display to honor Veterans.

Don't forget to give them awards for their participation and give them pamphlets on the history of the "Buddy" Poppy.

The VFW National Home for Children was founded in 1925 and is for Military and veterans who need a fresh start. Families can live at the National Home rent free for up to four years. At the National Home there are 42 single family homes. There is a gym, library, computer and science labs, a day care center, playgrounds, fishing pond, hiking trails and they even have their own Fire Department and Chapel. There is also a Helpline that is available to military families not living on campus. If you know of someone who needs assistance, encourage them to call the helpline at 1-800-313-4200.

One way we as an auxiliary supports the National Home is through our Health and Happiness donations of at least 10 cents per member. You can also support the National Home by becoming a life member for a one-time membership fee of \$50.

As my special project for the National Home this year, is to take collections at your auxiliary meetings or at your District meetings or even at functions that your auxiliary has supporting the VFW National Home Library Fund. I will also be posting videos of the "Cat in the Hat" reading some Dr. Seuss books through out the year. I will also post activity pages that you can do with your youth or share with a class at a local school. This year we will also be having a .1k walk at the National Home on Ohio Day on August 6<sup>th</sup>. All proceeds will be donated to the VFW National Home.

PLEASE **DO NOT** deviate from this CHAIN OF COMMAND Following this will make it easier for ALL of us!

### **Eligibility Requirements for VFW Auxiliary Membership:**

Members must be at least 16 years old.

Those eligible are:

- Husband/Wife
- Widower/Widow
- Father/Mother
- Grandfathers/Grandmothers
- Sons/Daughters
- Grandsons/Granddaughters
- Brothers/Sisters

Of persons who were or are eligible for membership in the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States.

Those eligible for membership in the VFW are those that have received a campaign medal for overseas service; have served 30 consecutive or 60 non-consecutive days in Korea; or have ever received hostile fire or imminent danger pay.

Step- and adopted parents, children, siblings (and half-siblings), grandparents and grandchildren are considered the same as biological parents, children, siblings, grandparents and grandchildren and may join the VFW Auxiliary under their VFW-eligible veteran.

Proof of service is required for eligibility and must be obtained by the applicant.

#### Membership

#### Department Chairman: Jess Gardner

#### Local Auxiliary Member:

- Annual dues vary by Auxiliary.
- Completed membership application, proof of eligibility (only if veteran is not a member of the same Post), and payment is sent to local Auxiliary.
- The local Auxiliary will investigate your eligibility and vote to accept or reject your application.
- May attend Auxiliary, County Council, District, Department (state) or National meetings, and is allowed to enter the business session of these meetings.
- May hold an office at the Auxiliary, County Council, District or Department (state) level.
- May be a Delegate to the National Convention.
- May participate in any of the National Programs and earn Auxiliary, District, Department (state) and National Awards.
- May qualify for Cancer Care Plus Insurance Program (Cancer Insurance).
- May receive a Cancer Grant, if eligible.
- May purchase self-pay insurances and burial benefits.

May participate in member benefits received through the mail, e-mail or listed on the National website. May receive VFW Auxiliary Magazine and e-newsletter.

Adding younger members is essential to the future of the VFW Auxiliary. However, younger people often have hectic schedules, family obligations, and financial constraints that make it difficult to commit to local Auxiliaries. We need to make VFW Auxiliary membership more attractive and more feasible for younger members. Here are several ideas that Auxiliaries can consider to attract younger members to the organization:

Reach out to current or past Scholarship winners/applicants to join.

I Create social and networking activities that are interesting and convenient for younger people. Encourage younger members to be involved in the planning of these events.

Invite groups of younger people to join at the same time to make them feel more comfortable. Help them encourage their peers to get involved as well.

I Foster an Auxiliary environment that is accepting of occasional absences. Perfect attendance is typically not attainable for today's younger members.

I Highlight monthly opportunities to get involved in local service projects.

Assign a current Auxiliary member to serve as a mentor for the first six months to make a new younger member feel welcome.

I Get younger members involved from the start. Younger members are creative and eager to generate new ideas for solving persistent Auxiliary problems. Ensure that the fresh ideas and knowledge of younger members have a voice and a space to grow.

Offer variety. Be open to the various ways that younger members can participate in your Auxiliary. Find out about their abilities and interests, and find ways to put them to good use in your Auxiliary's work.

Incorporate youth-welcoming messages in all Auxiliary communications that begin with the assumption that younger members are important to the organization because they make valuable contributions, and they are needed at all levels of Auxiliary leadership.
